- Paul and his traveling companions knew what they were getting when they went out. The dangers were made very clear (Acts 9:15-16, 14:19-22).
- I wonder if we have become a little naïve today about the cost of discipleship. Many things come easy to us, and we are easily discouraged by roadblocks and failures — how many unfinished craft projects, backyard ideas, musical instruments, and exercise gimmicks litter your home? But both Jesus (Matt. 10:34–39) and His disciples (1 Pet. 4:12–16) anticipated a rough road.

Some communities welcomed them warmly (even believing them to be gods, like in Lystra), others were less receptive (to the point of open hostility, like the craftsmen of Ephesus or the Jewish mob in Thessalonica).
- A lesson for us is that our challenges don't really follow a script.
 Evangelism requires us to think on our toes, bravely and boldly answering each person accordingly (Col. 4:2-6, 1 Pet. 3:15).




FELIX, WHO FEARED THE MESSAGE
